Film-Making & Techniques - 28/3/2022

What really makes a film so amazing? How have your favourite films truly made an impact on you? There are the essential components of story, acting performance, music and many more. That said, I believe the most vital to be the cinematographic aspect; how it is constructed through the director's camerawork and photography, transitions and placement of musical pieces. This is what truly finishes a brilliant piece. But who am I to say what is most important? The beauty of film lies of course in the perception of it all.

At Beeston Film Festival we're lucky enough to enjoy the jaw-dropping excellence of such film-making from the array of carefully selected masterpieces on show at the festival. There is a plethora of techniques and cinematography to be observed and awarded by our prestigious B'Oscars for the most expert of film-makers.

Swipe directed by Anthony Sneed, with cinematography by Aakash Raj, is a perfect example of the level of beauty and craftsmanship to be expected at the festival. Swipe is a quirky, light-hearted film with hilariously tense camera-work and music that really makes you feel the awkwardness and embarrassment of the situation, concluded with the sweet touch of a credit scene that I refuse to spoil! Sneed's picture is a prime piece to study when looking for a project that is carried out so professionally by the production's film-making and techniques, one that cannot be missed from your schedule. Another similar case is the rodent-centric animation World's Gone Nutz, constructed masterfully by visual effect artist Daniel Robert Cohn. This brilliant, humorous animation showcases the ordinary life of a family of squirrels that then bursts into a shocking and hilarious musical depiction of our own world as ruled by the furry tree-climbers. The uproarious, catchy tune is a relatable mockery of the current social, political and economic climate we all endure today. The fantastic visual effects by Cohn really make these furry friends come to life, hilariously enhanced by his own vocal performance.

sound, camera work and musical attachment can really make a scene and lead us, the viewers, to feel and react exactly as the film-makers intended. A shaky camera creeping through an old, rickety house alongside tense, sharp orchestral tones, for instance, dramatically intensifies our experience in watching horror. I myself feel very passionately about music and massively appreciate, as much as you, I'm sure, how it is used in a film and how the use of it can propel our experiences to another level. **My Friend Who Shines in the Night** is a beautiful blueprint of this, with its masterful musical balance in the opening sequence, orchestrated by Arthur Dairaine Andrianaivo, really setting the tone of our emotions and curiosity for the rest of the viewing.

We're proud to be showcasing such beautifully-made productions as **World's Gone Nutz**, **Swipe**, **My Friend Who Shines in the Night** at this year's Beeston Film Festival, and we're all eager to have you here.

Film and Genre - 31/03/22

There are over a hundred films on offer at this year's Beeston Film Festival, over a hundred different stories in all sorts of genres, and here we will go through some of the films showcased and discuss their genres.

What makes a film fit into a particular genre? Films will usually feature stories with certain criteria, meeting particular genre conventions in order to get us to watch and enjoy them. These conventions and genre tropes set an audience up to expect certain things; mysteries will have secrets & lies, family Christmas films will have Santa Claus and mince pies. The genres that we have in this festival are wide-ranging and I shall go through them and state some of the films in each of these genres.

First we have Drama. Drama can be a pretty catch-all genre! Anything could be classed as Drama really, and all films should have at least some element of drama in them, even comedies. It's about conflict and struggle, the issues faced by real people. Some of the Drama films that we have are **All That Glitters**, **Nimmerland**, **Birthday**, **Piglet Piglet** and of course many many others across the festival.

All of the Drama films on offer will make you grip the edge of your seats to see what happens next. That is the point of a good drama; to engage you and make you want to keep watching, to see what happens.

However, if Drama is not your thing we also have other genres. Let's look at Comedy. Comedy has many variations in itself, such as slapstick, sarcasm, dark humour. But the overall point of a comedy film is always the same: to make you laugh, of course! Whether it's witty dialogue, ironic situations or perfect comic timing, there's always something to giggle at when it comes to Comedy.

Some of the Comedy films we have at the festival this weekend include **Finding Dad**, **Numb** and **Swipe**. Of course there are also other films across the categories which could be considered comedies and therefore there are plenty of films that'll make you laugh this festival this weekend.

We also have documentary films if you are looking for something more serious and informative. Non-fiction films may not be as popular in the cinemas but they have become very trendy on streaming sites as new ways to tell real-life stories in the form of a documentary have come about. So, to see the world through new eyes in films told in unique and genuine ways, check out some of our documentary films at the festival which include; **Immigrant Voices of America**, **It Was A Time of Poetry** and **Pointe Blacke**.

Genre can be good for us to differentiate between films and to market to the right people. We as an audience want to know what a film will be like before we bother to watch it. For example, many people don't like Horror films. So, we as an audience want to know if a film is going to be scary before we go, as it may not be our cup of tea. The intensity of a creepy mood, the bloodiness of a gory murder... it's not for everyone!.

That being said, we do have some Horror films on offer for the thrill-seekers among you. If you are someone that likes to be scared out of your mind then maybe check out these films, including **Room 217**, **Smiles**, and **Aquamarine**.

Of course we also have Thrillers too which are slightly different to Horror. They focus on suspense over fear. They may have some scary moments but overall are not too scary - even we can handle them!

Hollow is a thriller which draws on themes of revenge, morality and injustice. It's a dark story of a grieving mother torn between faith and anger, a hard-hitting exploration of crime and punishment. There are plenty of thrillers on offer at the festival for those that want to be thrilled and chilled but not so terrified they can't sleep at night!

We also have Animated films which is more of a medium than a genre. Contrary to popular belief, they are not just for kids; they are more complex than many people think, and often deal with very real themes. We encourage you to check out some of the ones that we have on offer, maybe you'll be surprised by the likes of **The Soloists** and **My Friend Who Shines in the Night**.

You'll often find that stories try to tell you similar things, timeless stories of love and loss, struggle and triumph. The biggest difference is in how they're told. They change things up to keep the stories and messages fresh and new, and they play with genre to entice you to watch.

So, as you can see, we have a wide variety of genres represented in the festival. There's bound to be something for everyone! Perhaps this is why the film festival is such a good thing, as we are able to experience new films without the constraints of tying each film to a genre we're familiar with.

This year we're back face-to-face, at Beeston's Arc Cinema. All safety measures have been taken place for the event, all in line with recent Covid rules.All of the opening night's shows will take place in Screen 8 between 8pm and 9:30pm. Over the weekend there'll be a joyful celebration of film, stories of all different types and genres. You may even get a chance to see some of the film-makers at the festival, as well as seeing the films which will go on to win the coveted B'Oscar awards.

Opening Night - 01/04/2022

Finally, after three long years, the Beeston Film Festival is back in person and better than ever! I would like to start off by saying a much-awaited welcome, we are so incredibly happy to have you back. With your help, alongside that of our terrific team and film-makers, Beeston Film Festival continues to grow, and we will forever be immensely grateful for that.

Now then, I think there's been enough of that, let's talk films. Our brilliant festival launches with a colossal opening night, featuring some of the best short films from the entire selection. There is something here for everyone, and I personally cannot wait to tell you what we have in store for the fantastic first ninety minutes of Beeston Film Festival.

It all starts off with psychological drama: **When She Was Good**, following a young girl who discovers that Santa isn't real, leaving her upset and disoriented. Directed by London filmmaker Margarita Milne, **When She Was Good** is nominated for two B'Oscars; in the drama and performance categories, sure to be an excellent start to the festival.

Next up is **Tinned Pears**, directed by award-winning Libby Burke Wilde. This touching short story follows a young family living in food poverty. A truly impactful watch.

Around the halfway mark is Roy, featuring BAFTA award winner David Bradley. Created by the filmmaking partnership of Tom Berkeley and Ross White, Roy tells the heart-warming tale of how a man living in solitude discovers an unlikely companionship when he needs it most. Roy is nominated for a B'Oscar in performance, and is my personal favourite of the night, you won't want to miss it.

The fourth film is Irish horror **Bainne**, featuring Will Poulter and directed by his Midsommar costar, Jack Reynor. Our own festival director, John Currie, describes Poulter's performance here as a "gritty, humble yet compelling" one, portraying a stoic farmhand in the last year of The Great Famine in Ireland who encounters a ghostly figure who steals his milk, leading him on a journey of faith. **Bainne** is up for a total of four B'Oscars, including Best in Festival.

Our penultimate film of the night is a dark, revenge thriller exploring the moral and religious intricacies surrounding the concept of revenge and redemption. **Hollow** showcases brilliant performances from Laura Bayston, Karl Collins and Kris Hitchen, alongside the award-winning direction of Bristolian Paul Holbrook. **Hollow** is nominated for two B'Oscars, including Best Drama and Best Performance, you are sure to see why.

Last, but certainly not least is French animation, The Soloists. This powerful and imaginative short work of art shows us in a small village ruled by ridiculous and arbitrary laws, where three singing sisters and their dog rehearse for the Annual Autumn Festival, when an unexpected event disrupts their plans. The Soloists may take home two of our prestigious B'Oscars, including Best in Festival and Best Animation, a dazzling end to an infinitely immersive opening night.

Friday is just the beginning of a bountiful weekend, packed full of memorable movies with experiences to last a lifetime.

Festival Update - 02/04/2022

Wow, what an incredible opening night we had last night at 2022's Beeston Film Festival! A roller-coaster of emotions from the heart-warming **Roy**, to the dark and mysterious **Bainne**. A truly dazzling night. I'm honoured to welcome you to the superb Saturday lineup we have today, full of laughs, terror, tears and joy. So without further ado, let's dive straight into the fabulous festival day we have ahead of us.

To jump-start Saturday at the festival we have the 'Nutty' Variety Pack being shown in screen 7 from 12:00pm to 1:30pm. Here we have a brilliant selection of short films including: **Tella**, **Murmur of Icebergs**, **Down**, **Intact**, **Trace of a Butterfly**, **Living All of Life** and to finish off, **The World's Gone Nutz**. This amazing animative start to the day is sure to tickle the funny bone, with multiple B'Oscar-nominated **The World's Gone Nutz** fighting for awards in both Best Animation and Music Video. Anyone with a soft-spot for animation, such as myself, would be nutz to miss it. See what I did there? Okay... moving swiftly on...

However, if this selection doesn't quite pump your goosebumps, we have the 'Animated Life' Variety Pack being shown in Screen 8 in the same time slot. This slot contains a kaleidoscope of movie magic to be witnessed, such as: **Blood Swim**, **Wings for Butterflies**, **75/1**, **Prayer**, **The Dalang's Tale**, **Paper Straws**, **Lamppost**, **Mr Wong's Lullaby**, **Goodbye Home**, **Davey's Lullaby** and **Pile** to finish off the slot.

An excellent collection of films to start the day in Screen 8, finishing with the award-winning and fascinating **Pile**. Staying seated following a short break at screen 8 this time, from 2:00pm to 3:30pm we have the 'Sequences' slot, for Sci-fi fanatics such as myself. This set includes: **Prelude & Fugue in Dm**, **Cingulate**, **The Name of the Prime Minister**, **The Forgetting Device**, **Blank Shores**, **3000**, **But Happy** and **Human Trash** to end the ninety minutes.

Amongst these are five B'Oscar nominees, with **The Forgetting Device**, **Blank Shores**, **3000**, **But Happy** and **Human Trash** all up for Best Science Fiction. **Human Trash** is also up for Best Cinematography, definitely not to be missed for you Sci-fi lovers!

If Science Fiction isn't in your interests then not to worry, in Screen 7 at the same time we have the 'Public Gaze' themed Drama films. This compromises of quintuple B'Oscar-nominated **Inquity**, including Best in Festival, alongside: **Chapel of Rest**, **One-Life Stand**, **All That Glitters**, **Feeling Through** and **The Saverini Widow**. Staying in Screen 7 and moving on to the 4:00pm to 5:30pm, we have the genius 'Gaps' Variety Pack, made up of eight short wonders involving: **Party in My Head**, **The Magentalman** and **The Gentlemint**, **Late**, **The Case**, **Dissolution**, **The Secret Life of Tom Lightfoot**, **Brunch** and **PRAGMA** to round up that slot.

This magnificent mixture has something for everyone and is a great experience for those wanting a mix of genres! It also includes B'Oscar nominee for Animation: **Brunch**. At the same time over in Screen 8 we have the 'Focus on Iran' Drama compendium, showcasing our splendid submissions from Iranian film-makers. This contains: **Today Is Friday**,

Ceremony, Birthday, Love Can't Be Quarantined, Emergency, Mandatory and The Wound.

This display of international excellence holds two B'Oscar nominees; **Mandatory** for Drama, and **The Wound** for Women's Voices. Carrying us into the early evening at 6:00pm - 7:30pm in Screen 8, we have the 'Journeys' selection, films focusing on Women's Voices : **8Teen**, **Eyelashes of the Exodus**, **Elle**, **The Hollows of the Moon** and **Gratitude Journal**.

In this slot are three B'Oscar nominees competing for a total of 7 (yes, 7!) of our prestigious B'Oscar awards. Firstly is **Elle** fighting for three awards in: Best Direction, Women's Voices and Best in Festival. Next is **Gratitude Journal**, also up for three in: Best Script, Women's Voices and Best in Festival, and finally **The Hollows of the Moon** also duelling for best in Women's Voices. If this set doesn't tickle your fancy, in Screen 7 at the same time we have the 'Grad Pack', portraying our scrappy student-made films. This hour and a half starts with the thought-provoking **Awakening**, followed by: **Glory, Jackrabbit of Adventure, MORS DAG, Kintsugi, Maeve in the Dark, Brutes** and **The Removal** finishing at 7:30pm.

This slot accommodates two B'Oscar nominees for best in the Student category: **The Removal** and **Brutes**. To finish off a tantalising Saturday at Beeston Film Festival we have the two final slots in Screen 7 and 8, starting at 8:00pm and finishing at 9:30pm. In Screen 7 we have the 'Memories' Drama selection for you to feast your eyes on. Here you will be able to see the double B'Oscar-nominated **Embers**, accompanied by: **Nimmerland**, **Montage Life**, **Inheritance** and **Appa Appa**.

Alternatively, in Screen 8 we have the 'Keep Smiling' Horror collection, not for the faint-hearted! If you're a Horror lover such as myself, you have seven scary delights to tuck into, including Best Script and Horror B'Oscar-nominated **Aquamarine**, Horror B-Oscar Nominees **Smiles** and **THE OTHER ONE**, not to mention four: **The Hunter's Cabin**, **Conditioning**, **Room 217** and **Meat Market**.

That concludes Saturday at this year's Beeston Film Festival, a truly eventful day full of a multiplicity of emotions and fabulous film experiences. We'll call it a day here and gather some much needed rest for another thrilling day of film tomorrow - the finale!

The Last Day - 03/04/2022

We are at the final day of the festival. Yes, that is sad; we want to show you so much more! Once today's over, you'll have to wait until next year when we'll be back with more great films again. For now, let's take a look at what is on offer for the final day of the festival.

And it is going to be good! Firstly, we have 'Blurred Light', our Variety Pack, where there are nine films you can watch. This will be running from 12:00pm until 1:30pm. The list of films in this slot include: **Survivors of**

Violence Tell Their Story, The Gate, Dean Quarry, Norma, On/Off, Come Close to Me, Late Fees, Chinese Fusion, and My Friend Who Shines in the Night. A real emotional roller-coaster! Within this group are some films that have been nominated for our B'Oscar awards. Late Fees is nominated in the Music Video category, while My Friend Who Shines in the Night is up for Best in Festival so be sure to check that out!

Of course all categories are highly competitive, given the quality of films submitted, and it's so difficult to choose a winner. **My Friend Who Shines in the Night** is also nominated in the Animation and Sound Design & Soundtrack categories, so you know it's worth a watch!

These films will be showcased in Screen 7 but if they don't tickle your fancy then don't worry, there's more to choose from. In Screen 8 at the same time, 12:00pm to 1:30pm, we have the 'Quiet Shelter' slot, featuring more of our best Women's Voices films. These include **RUST**, **Silence**, **Silence Undone**, **Invited In** and **Cold Beds**.

Of these films, Cold Beds is nominated for best in its category, as well as for Best Cinematography. Staying in Screen 7, we then move on to our 'Payback'-themed Crime slot from 2:00pm to 3:30pm. This session includes **Highly Competent Killers**, **All Because of the Damned Blonde's Son**, **Pops**, **Baptism**, **Earl's Town** and **A Roll in the Hay**. Amongst these are some B'Oscar nominees, with **A Roll in the Hay**, **Earl's Town**, **Baptism** and **Pops** being nominated for Best Crime Film. **A Roll in the Hay** is also nominated for Best in Festival, so, definitely worth checking out this one.

If crime isn't your cup of tea, not to worry; running at the same time in Screen 8 we have 'Wilderness', our Non-Fiction category. These include **It Was a Time of Poetry**, **Conviction**, **La Muter Salvaje**, **Pointe Black**, **Dajla: Cinema and Oblivion**, and **Palisian**.

Palisian, Dajla: Cinema and Oblivion, Pointe Black and *Le Muter Salvage* are all up for B'Oscars in the Non-Fiction category. Late afternoon we move into 'Love and Pride'. These films will be shown from 4.00pm to 5:30pm in Screen 7, and include **The O Show**, *Xmas Eve Eve, Sand Land*, **The Aquarium**, **Aquamarine** and **Bracha**.

Bracha, **The Aquarium**, **Xmas Eve Eve** and **Aquamarine** all make up the Pride category's B'Oscar nominations, while **Aquamarine** is also nominated in the Best Horror and Best Script categories. Of course while that's running there's also the option of Screen 8, where you can catch the 'Change Now' slot, films around the theme of A Better Place. These include **Perspective Shift**, **Immigrant Voices of America**, **Free Fall** and **The Race Against Race**.

B'Oscar nominations in this category include **The Race Against Race**, **Free Fall** and **Immigrant Voices of America**. Moving into the evening we have 'Ghosts', our Drama slot, from 6.00pm to 7:30pm.

These include Shot, In Memoriam Dr H.G.K., C-Section, Piglet Piglet, The Heart Asunder, Guide Me Home, A Dead Sea, Hey Ma, and Ghost Girl.

So much drama, we're glad to be merely onlookers! Of course there are B'Oscar nominations here too. **Guide Me Home** is nominated for Best Sound Design & Soundtrack, but the film running away with the nominations here is **Ghost Girl**; it's nominated for Best Drama, Direction, Sound Design & Soundtrack as well as Best in Festival. Definitely one not to miss!

And of course we have alternative options in Screen 8 in the category of Comedy, in a slot we've called 'Truth'. These include **Finding Dad**, **Snorrie**, **Bobo - The Intermission Clown**, **Candle Cops**, **Numb** and **Swipe**. **Swipe**, **Numb**, **Bobo - The Intermission Clown** and **Candle Cops** are all nominated for Best Comedy. **Swipe** is also nominated in the Student Film category and **Bobo - The Intermission Clown** is also nominated for Best Script.

With all the films screened, make sure you stick around for the awards session! This will be held at 8.00pm and finish at 9:30pm, and we'll get to find out which of the filmmakers will be taking home the coveted B'Oscar awards. Wow, that's a long day of films! There are so many things to see today and not enough time to fully see them and appreciate them without a time machine.
